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Breaking Ground

In the past few weeks I have been involved in groundbreaking and ribbon cutting ceremonies. Hiwassee College announced a \$7.2 million effort with the US Department of Agriculture to renovate and renew Brock Hall and the Library as well as some new projects. We handed the keys to Chastity Harris on the Habitat for Humanity house that the Maryville District constructed. The Holston Conference is a partner with Appalachia Service Project in building houses for the Gatlinburg fire recovery work. We broke ground on the first house which is partially funded with money from Holston. Family Promise cut the ribbon on their new day center and offices that are housed in the former Bungalow UMC building. All of these are ground breaking work.

Several times Jesus used the image of plowing and sowing as pictures of the Kingdom of God. Often our work in the Kingdom is to prepare the ground for the seeds from which the Kingdom grows. Preparing ground—particularly new ground—is difficult, backbreaking work. Simply getting things ready for the planting is toilsome.

We sometimes work and do not get to see the harvest. I think about the folks who built Bungalow nearly 100 years ago. They would never have dreamed that their building would house homeless families during the day. They would never have imagined all the Bible school days, the Sunday school classes, the weddings, funerals, baptisms, conversions that would take place in the building they worked so hard to construct.

Sometimes our work is preparation—simply getting things ready. Laying a foundation, nailing studs together as the skeletons for walls, just breaking ground. However, even in those tasks we proclaim that the Kingdom of God is at hand.

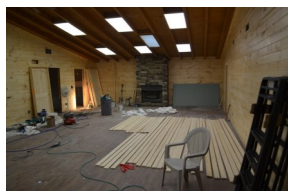


Registration for Summer Camp at Wesley Woods

Thirteen Maryville District United Methodist Women and one honorary UMW husband joined with our sisters in Christ at Monte Vista Baptist Church on April 1st to pack new and gently used bras for Free The Girls. In a short two and half hours later 3,416 bras were packed and ready for shipment! We don't think so much about such a simple thing as a bra changing lives of women around the world, but it does. There are currently 27 million men, women and children held as slaves around the world and 80 percent of those are women and girls. The bras we packed will end up in Africa where they will provide an avenue for women who have been rescued from sex trafficking to earn a living selling second-hand bras while they go back to school. Simple thing – big impact!

The Wesley House Tablescape Fundraiser was held on April 8th. The proceeds from Tablescapes will help to fund the summer program at Wesley House. Maryville District UMW sponsored and decorated a table for Tablescapes. We were entertained by the Wesley House children as they demonstrated their talents of dancing and playing piano, violin and ukulele. Sponsoring a table is another simple thing with a big impact.

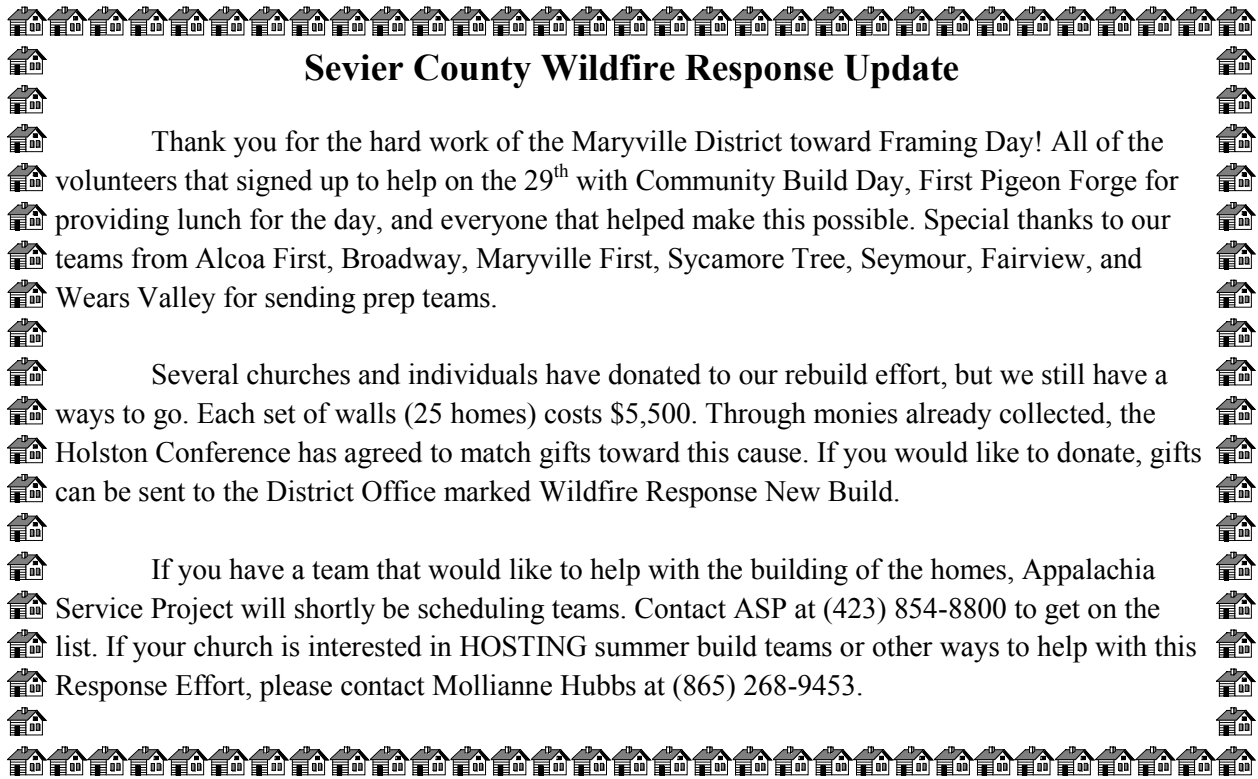
2017 Hands-On Mission Project- Zimbabwe Holston Annual Conference

Unlike school supplies, food items have expiration dates. Be sure and check the dates and make sure they do not expire until 2018 in order to cover transport time and having a useful life for the people in Zimbabwe.

The Maryville District has been asked to put together 400 Food Buckets for the 2017 Holston Annual Conference Hand-On Mission Project. *Note: A \$5.00 donation for packing and shipping is to accompany each bucket. Sevier County Wildfire Response Update

Thank you for the hard work of the Maryville District toward Framing Day! All of the volunteers that signed up to help on the 29th with Community Build Day, First Pigeon Forge for providing lunch for the day, and everyone that helped make this possible. Special thanks to our teams from Alcoa First, Broadway, Maryville First, Sycamore Tree, Seymour, Fairview, and Wears Valley for sending prep teams.

Several churches and individuals have donated to our rebuild effort, but we still have a ways to go. Each set of walls (25 homes) costs \$5,500. Through monies already collected, the Holston Conference has agreed to match gifts toward this cause. If you would like to donate, gifts can be sent to the District Office marked Wildfire Response New Build.

Spring has sprung, but it is time to plan for the harvest!

The end of the first quarter 2017 definitely provided good news concerning YTD investment returns (BALANCED GROWTH +10.7% over the trailing 12 months and a trailing average annual return of 5.8% over the last ten years). Spring has arrived along with tax season and pollen season too. Financial advisors caution us to think ahead to next year concerning our projected income so that we are not caught off guard with an unexpected tax bill. Physicians might advise we take an allergy-relief medication so we can still enjoy the flowers.

In the last Circuit Rider Dispatch we shared information on preparing for a future harvest in your church through planned giving education and awareness. In this issue I want to focus on how you spend from an endowment, scholarship or other special purpose fund invested in our Balanced Growth Fund to maximize distributions while protecting the spending power of the fund against inflation (Inflation by the way is back over 2% and has averaged over 3% since 1926.) The tool we suggest uses the 3 year market average and a spending rate of 4% instead of simply using growth, interest or dividends to set distributions. Over time the concept provides a disciplined approach that maximizes and increases distributions, lowers the impact of market swings and protects the of the fund from inflation. The attached illustration demonstrates that a \$100k gift in 1992 provided over \$168k in a growing stream of distributions through the years while doubling the value of when it started. An endowment, scholarship, cemetery maintenance, parsonage, /housing fund, etc. using such a formula that can be counted on in your church's future might be a real blessing!
