Trinity United Methodist Church in Lenoir City is proud of its history of ministry and service. As members prepare for their 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration on Sunday, September 10, they are remembering the past and focusing on the future.

Trinity offers traditional music and liturgy each Sunday with an invitation to encounter the holiness of God through song, creeds, responsive readings, prayers, partaking in the Sacrament of Holy Communion and the Word of God.

Rev. Kristie Banes is serving her second year as leader of Trinity's congregation. Former pastor Rev. Andy Ferguson and Rev. Henry Lenoir, a descendant of the church's founding family, will assist in the Worship Service on Celebration Sunday.

Worship will begin at 10:30 a. m. on September 10<sup>th</sup>. The church will also be open from 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 9<sup>th</sup>, for those who cannot attend the worship service on Sunday.

Everyone is invited to drop in on Saturday or attend Worship on Sunday.

Founded by the Lenoir brothers in 1867, the church moved to the present location at the corner of 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue and C Street in the early 1900s. Major renovations were done in the early 1960s and mid 1990s to create the church that stands today. A Tennessee Historical Commission marker recognizes Trinity as the oldest congregation in Lenoir City.



Trinity has served the community for 150 years. Its members have been important in the development and history of Lenoir City and Loudon County. Their lives and devotion to the church reflect the abiding faith and love that have filled the church for over a century.
